The Ultimate Question

One of my favorite books is the *Hitchhiker's Guide to the Universe*. Besides that it's good, clean fun, what I loved about the book is that its metaphors for life. My favorite was that the purpose behind our existence on planet earth is to join in the quest for the answer to life's preeminent question: What is the answer to "life, the universe, and everything"?

Years later, as a church pastor, I came to understand that for the church there is a more foundational question than just the meaning of life, a question we're each faced with that has eternal consequences. I dubbed that inquiry *The Ultimate Question:*

What is it about your relationship with Jesus Christ that the world needs to know?

I began asking that question of my parishioners and my colleagues to learn what answers they'd come up with. What I found was that only a few people had a ready answer to the question as asked. Instead, most of those I asked responded to a very different question. Most people told me about how wonderful their church was, how the church had always been there for them, and how much they loved their church. Most people told me about their relationship with the church.

Now, it's important to know why you love your church, and it's important to be able to put those reasons into words because someone might ask you about your church. But we live in a culture where the word *church* comes with some serious baggage and the vast majority of Americans have made it plain that they are *not* interested in church, and they're especially not interested in going to church! (Last weekend,

less than 85 percent of USAmericans attended a worship service of any sort.)

But that doesn't mean that people aren't interested in faith and spirituality. In fact, research and surveys both show that the people across this nation are *very* interested in spiritual things. It's church and Christianity that they're especially not interested in.

Which brings us back to the Ultimate Question. Although most of our neighbors have little interest in your relationship to your church, many would be very interested to have a conversation about your relationship with the Divine. One of the unique teachings in Christianity is that we worship a God who actually seeks to be in a relationship with us ... a God who cares, who listens, and who wants to be actively involved in our day-to-day lives.

And that is why your answer to the Ultimate Question is so important – the fact is, you have neighbors who would truly be interested in your answer.

As I asked members and colleagues what their responses were, I discovered that most of us are unprepared to articulate an answer to the question. In part, I'm sure it's because we haven't asked ourselves that question, so we haven't thought through the answer. But the fact is, the church hasn't been terribly proactive in equipping us to answer the question either.

As I listened to those who *did* have a ready answer to the question, I noticed there were five broad themes most of the answers reflected. I put these together and created what I called *The Five Faces of Jesus*. These were five different characteristics of Jesus that people could really relate to, and while many of us can relate to more than one of these characteristics, I've found that if we choose the predominant characteristic for our response to the Ultimate Question, our stories have focus and strength.

Below are brief descriptions of The Five Faces of Jesus. (If you are interested in a more extensive description, you might want to check out the Church-Talk episode Kris and I did on the subject some years ago: http://churchtalk.tv/the-five-faces-of-jesus/).

Jesus as Companion

Those who relate to this characteristic of Jesus often share they're aware that Jesus is always with them as a constant companion and friend. The woman who cared for our children while Kris and I were in seminary would say that this is the Jesus her neighbors needed to hear about. A widow for many, many years, Nanny lived her day-to-day life in constant conversation with Jesus. Although she had a rich prayer life, most of her conversation with Jesus was just that ... an ongoing conversation. She was never lonely because she was never alone. Not only did she "know" Jesus was always there, Jesus simply was always there and she spoke with him throughout the day. Perhaps this is similar to your story – a story that others need to hear in order to have hope.

Jesus as Rescuer

Those who relate to this side of Jesus often share that their lives were crashing, burning, and out of control. They were prisoners of their sins, their bad choices, or their addictions. Bound with chains, they had lost all hope. A friend of ours in Seattle, Sherry (not her real name), would say that this is the Jesus everyone needs to hear about. Sherry was addicted to cocaine and had tried to kick the habit for years. When she came to us, she admitted she'd tried everything to get free, but to no avail ... and so she decided to give God a try. Less than three months later, she was clean, sober, and free from her addiction and she attributed it all to Jesus. (And she told pretty much everyone about how Jesus had rescued her!)

Jesus as Healer

Those who relate to Jesus as healer have experienced a special touch from above. Sometimes they've experienced a physical healing, sometimes an emotional healing, or perhaps a spiritual healing. Whatever the healing was, they can point to some event or some answered prayer that brought them wholeness. Tim was a work colleague of mine who had some sort of skin disease that would not clear up. Medications failed, allergy tests were inconclusive, and the best that could be done was to apply a powerful moisturizer. He attended a special evening church service many years ago and the preacher invited those who needed prayer to come forward. Tim felt a need to "go to the altar" and when he did, the prayer team prayed for him. The next morning. his skin problems had vanished and have never returned. When asked about his relationship with Jesus, Tim will tell you about how Jesus healed him. (And he carries a pocket watch with him as a talisman so that when people ask him about the watch, he can tell his story).

Jesus as Guide

Those who relate to Jesus as guide often tell of aimless, purposeless, meaningless lives that were going nowhere ... until Jesus. This is my story. I was raised in the church and there's never been a time in my life when Jesus wasn't "in my heart." However, as a young adult, I bounced from job to job to job so often that my resumé was embarrassingly long. It wasn't that I kept getting fired – I was very good at pretty much everything I did. The problem was that I got bored with every job within just a few months. My life was unfulfilled and empty. I felt like I had no purpose. Then came a time of prayer when I felt, rather than heard, Jesus suggesting, "If you want to be fulfilled, then follow me. I've got a job for you." Ever since then, I've done my best to listen to where Jesus is leading ... he's become my guide that pointed me "preacher school," seminary, and

into professional ministry. And ever since that time, life has not only made sense, but I've had an incredible time. Yes, I really do love my job now – and I "blame" Jesus for that.

Jesus as Promise Keeper

Finally, those who relate to Jesus as promise keeper tend to be the most contented people on the planet. These are often in circumstances that seem hopeless to rest of the world. Rufus from Ethiopia was one of these. Rufus was a fellow student in Seattle. He was honing his skills in ministry because he wanted to start churches in his home country. The problem, at least as far as the rest of the student body was concerned, was that it was illegal to engage in evangelism in Ethiopia and those who started churches were typically hunted down and killed (martyred). We tried to convince Rufus to remain in the US, to claim refugee status - and we were all willing to sponsor his request. But Rufus was adamant, "Whether I live or whether I die, I know Jesus will keep his promises for the church. My work will not be in vain."

Others who relate to Jesus as promise keeper may have mortal diseases, illnesses, or injuries. I've known those who are in abject poverty who were certain they'd never escape their situation. In both cases, those who relate to Jesus as promise keeper live with a certainty that "everything is going to be alright ... if not now, then someday. Jesus always keeps his promises."

So ... who is the Jesus you most relate to? Of course, these aren't the only characteristics of Jesus, but they are the ones I've heard about most often from others. If you can articulate your relationship with Jesus, then you have to means to respond in meaningful ways when someone asks you for the reason for your hope (1 Peter 3:15) ... or if they ask you, "Why do you go to church?"



Moderator's MinuteJeff Steele, Moderator

Hello everyone! I wanted to update you on some things happening in the life of the church. First, you've all probably seen work underway to make audio/video enhancements in the Fellowship Hall, Lobby/Narthex area, and in the Sanctuary. Enhancements in all areas should be complete by the time you read this article. We've held Praise Service in the Fellowship Hall for 4 weeks now and will soon be video streaming both the Classic Service and Praise Service to the RCC web page so that people looking for a church home (or who have limitations preventing their attendance) will be able to watch our services on-line.

We're also pursuing another infrastructure improvement project involving the roof on the Education Wing/Children's wing. On any given rainy day, you'll see buckets and trash cans scattered throughout the hall, nursery, and classrooms in the Children's wing. Of course, this isn't a good environment for our kids and certainly isn't welcoming or inviting for new families bringing their children to RCC. We have sought competitive bids for replacement of the roof and have received endorsement from the Endowments Trustees to fund this project through the Building and Property fund. This funding offer was approved by the General Board and will be brought forward to the congregation for an approval vote at the upcoming congregational meeting scheduled for June 10th. Additional details can be found in the Congregational Meeting article of this Pilot.

Finally, we've identified a cost savings opportunity involving the replacement of the current fluorescent lighting in the Fellowship

Hall. Through an arrangement with yellowblue LED and an energy rebate being offered by KCPL, RCC will replace the existing lighting with new LED lighting. After rebate, the cost to RCC will only be \$3,300, which the Endowment Trustees have agreed to fund via distribution from the Property Operating and Maintenance Fund. In addition to the LED lights requiring less energy to provide a superior quality light and better lighting control, they operate cooler which will result in less cooling expense. The estimated payback period for this investment in more efficient and cost-effective lighting is 4 years, with a continuing \$900 annual savings to the church's energy budget. Further, all bulbs and fixtures are 100% replacement covered for This action does not require 5 years. congregational approval.

In closing, I ask you to continue to pray for the leadership of this church and for those in our community whom God desires for us to reach.

It's good to be in ministry together!

Upcoming Congregational Meeting – June 10th following both services

A Congregational Meeting will be held on June 10th, 2018 at the end of both services. Agenda items for the meeting will include:

 Approval of the distribution of funds from Endowments for the Education Wing Roof Replacement project.

The Raytown Christian Church Endowment Trustees recommend the expenditure of \$65,170 to cover repair and replacement costs for the roof and guttering of the educational building. The funds will be withdrawn from the permanent Building and Property endowment fund, which had a balance of \$318,116.07 as of 12/31/2017 at Christian Church Foundation. Since the Building and Property Fund is considered

restricted, requests for distributions must be introduced to the General Board (two-thirds majority [2/3]) by the Trustees, thus this motion. The General Board approved the motion, which now requires a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the congregation.

The roof replacement will involve removal of existing modified bitumen roofing and replacement with new state of the art roofing material, consisting of 60 mil Thermoplastic Polyolefin (TPO) fully adhered roofing, covering mechanically attached, tapered polyisocyanurate insulation over the entire roof to achieve drainage sloping. insulation will provide an R value of approximately 19. Also, 8" box gutters will be installed on the north and south sides of this roofing to carry away the roof surface drainage. The intent of this guttering will be to provide downspouts at the NW and SW corners of this roof and draining into the west parking lot. The new roof will have a materials warranty of 20 years by the manufacturer.
